Dear Professor Bellalta:

The Landscape Architectural Accreditation Board (LAAB) at its February 10-11, 2017 meeting granted accreditation for a period of six (6) years to the course of study leading to the first professional MLA degree at Boston Architectural College. This status is subject to review of annual reports and maintenance of good standing.

Accreditation is awarded on a time-certain basis. The six-year period of accreditation ends December 31, 2022. Accordingly, the MLA program is next scheduled for a review during the fall of 2022.

In making its decision, LAAB considered the program's self-evaluation report, the visiting team report, the institution's response to the team report, and discussions with team members and program faculty.

Enclosed is a list of recommendations affecting accreditation (to be responded to in annual reports). This list was developed by LAAB from the materials reviewed during the meeting.

Recommendations Affecting Accreditation

The faculty needs to review carefully the thesis process, including the three courses that comprise the research sequence, to determine strategies for implementing a process and a set of expectations that would result in stronger and more thorough research products, whether these be called theses or terminal projects (Standard 3).
