She ran and runs Career Fairs, supports the professional fraternity Sigma Lambda Alpha as a member. She serves as the staff support base for many College offerings to the profession such as continuing education, short courses, and courses preparing applicants for the licensing exams. She serves and is a tireless promoter on the scholarship committee of the College that annually awards more than \$120,000 to its students.

Audra is both in front of the scenes as well as behind them and supporting the many annual events held throughout the College and in its public services as well as the recent hosting of the annual national student conference LABash 2013. She very often simply hosts visitors, incoming students and their families or related professional tours.

Two significant awards recognizing her outstand work include the 2011 Tri State Conference Edith Henderson Award and the 2011 College Staff Member of the Year Award given during the annuals Honors Dinner.

She built and continues to manage an extensive social network for the promotion, education and the professional and career development of all Landscape Architects and their allied professionals.

This letter is a reference for job applicant Audra Lofton. I am a former faculty member in the University of Georgia's College of Environment and Design, from which I retired in 2015. I have known Audra for 15 years, since she first moved into the design school from the business school. I saw her in a variety of working relationships as she progressed from one staff position to another, and I too worked in a variety of responsible faculty and administrative position, and the needs and programs of the school evolved. Her jobs always had something to do with watching over finances for various programs, projects, or the school as a whole. She also increasingly took on the logistics of events such as conferences, continuing---education courses, alumni events, and football---weekend "tailgating" events. The events ranged in size into hundreds of people; some of them involved travel to other cities and distant states; few of them were limited to weekday working hours. After a while it was no longer a surprise to see here there cheerfully running things in the early mornings or over the weekends, but it was always for me a pleasure and a booster of my confidence that things would go well. She imagined details that I hadn't event thought of; and the first time I heard of them, she had already made arrangements. One of my favorite memories from my many years at the university is her saying about an upcoming large, complicated, intense, expensive event (a college---wide 200---student, week---long "charrette" that was being organized for the first time), in a sweeping generalization about finances, meals, chairs, auditorium reservations, web---site management, mailing lists, student volunteers, table setups, etc.: "Oh yeah, we can do that". And thank God, she always turned out to be right. At all times she characteristically wanted to know what was coming up in the community, and what was needed, so she could be part of it, help, contribute, and make it work. I have seen her overcome some family hardships with admirable strength, determined cheer, and resilience. Through her involvement she became inspired by the kind of work we were doing in the design school, to the extent that she has mentioned the possibility of studying for a landscape architectural degree. I am certain that in the future Audra will be a cheering contributor to our community.
